SCIENCE IN DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

The Fall 1985 issue of 4S Review carries a stimulating call to arms for more research in science studies relating to developing countries. Author MICHAEL J. MORAVCSIK (Institute of Theoretical Science, University of Oregon) gives "reasons why such research would be attractive and valuable, and how one can arrive at a list of research topics that would be fruitful and interesting." He then provides a "partial list of such topics," and concludes with a discussion of the "methodological and logistic problems" involved. Moravcsik's article articulates an agenda that might well prove valuable to Pacific Circle scholars.

Scientific Colonialism: A
Cross-Cultural Comparison is now
in print from the Smithsonian
Institution Press. It contains
the papers of the U.S.-Australian
bilateral conference on science
and colonialism held in Melbourne
in 1981. Editors are Nathan
Reingold and Marc Rothenberg.

Trans-Pacific Echos and
Resonances; Listening Once Again,
by JOSEPH NEEDHAM & LU GWEI-DJEN,
was issued in 1985 by World Scientific Publishing. It is the
result of a conference of
Asianists and Meso-Americanists
held in Mexico in 1977 to reexamine the evidence for the transmission of Asian cultural
influences to Central and South
American Indian civilizations.

Soviet-American Horizons on the Pacific, edited by JOHN J. STEPHAN and V.P. CHICHKANOV, was published earlier this year by the University of Hawaii Press. Included in its 11 articles is "Soviet-American Scientific Cooperation in the Pacific," by ROBERT RANDOLPH and JOHN BARDACH.

A Voyage Around the World With the Romanzov Exploring Expedition in the Years 1815-1818, In the Brig 'Rurik', Captain Otto von Kotzebue, by Adelbert von Chamisso, has been translated from the Russian by HENRY KRATZ and published by University of Hawaii Press.

Hawaiian Medicine Book: He
Buke Laau Lapaau, translated by
MALCOLM NAEA CHUN (Honolulu: Bess
Press, 1986) is a translation of
possibly the earliest written
native Hawaiian account of medical
concepts and practices. It was

originally related by a Hawaiian informant in 1837 and published in a Hawaiian language newspaper in 1858-1859.

Günter Schilder's Voyage to the Great Southland: Villem de Vlamingh, 1696-1697 has recently been published by the Royal Australian Historical Society. Copies of this remarkable account, by one of the world's leading historians of cartography, can be ordered from the RAHS at History House, 133 Macquarie St., Sydney, N.S.W., Australia 2000.

The History of Cartography, Vol. I: Cartography in Prehistoric, Ancient, and Medieval Europe and the Mediterranean, is scheduled for publication in January, 1987, by the University of Chicago Press. Edited by J.B. HARLEY and DAVID WOODWARD of the Department of Geography, University of Wisconsin, the full work is projected to reach six volumes and promises to be "the first comprehensive history of maps and mapping worldwide from prehistory to the present."
